IMPORTANT HOUDINI SPIRITUALISM SCRAPBOOKS

357. Houdini, Harry (Ehrich Weisz). A Two Volume Spiritualism Scrapbook Kept and Annotated by Harry Houdini. Two quarto volumes (12 x 10"), approximately 200 and 140 leaves respectively, obtained from Houdini's collection by the magician-mentalist Joseph Dunninger, and bound by the latter in maroon cloth, spines lettered in gilt. Principally spanning 1922-25, with some supplemental clippings added by Dunninger as late as 1930, the earliest about 1892. Comprised of hundreds of newspaper and news-magazine clippings pertaining to spiritualism and related subjects, the second volume (bulk 1922) almost entirely devoted to coverage of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's belief in spiritualism and the supernatural, and signed "Houdini" three times, with scattered annotations, including below a headline from the New York Herald on the "mysterious intuitions" of which a young St. Louis girl appeared capable: "This is a lie Doyle told me he never even spoke to the girl. I believe it was only a press agent stunt of HC./Houdini". The first volume (bulk 1924-25) focusing on exposures of the methods of fake mediums and spiritualists, including coverage of Houdini's own public challenges made to mediums, including Margery (Mina Crandon), and containing at least a dozen annotations in Houdini's hand, with several clippings regarding police raids of "spook parlors" in San Francisco supplied to Houdini and annotated by Samuel "Shadow" Baldwin. Clippings mainly from major American and English newspapers (New York, London, Boston, Chicago, San Francisco, Denver, and elsewhere), but also representing papers of other American and English locales, as well as Scotland, Germany, and Brazil. Most pieces securely affixed to pages, a small proportion flaked off and laid in on the appropriate page. 30,000/40,000

These scrapbooks offer fascinating personal insights into the project of "spirit debunking" to which Houdini turned in the final chapter of his life and career. Central to the scrapbooks' pages are the figures and cases which captured Houdini's attention at the height of public interest in the topic, including Margery and Arthur Conan Doyle, both of whom were primary subjects of inquiry for Houdini and his followers. Dunninger, a prominent magician and friend of Houdini's, became one of the leading torch-bearers into psychic investigation in the decade following Houdini's death, publishing the exposé "Inside the Medium's Cabinet" in 1935. The scrapbooks were inherited by Dunninger among troves of Houdini's records and relics after the magician's death in 1926, and have remained in Dunninger's family's possession ever since.


Houdini wrote at great length of his visit to Frikell's in The Unmasking of Robert-Houdin (1908). Houdini arrives in 1903 hoping to interview the great magician, then retired, as to whether he had preceded Robert-Houdin in ushering in the golden age of magic by being the first popular magician to perform "pure sleight of hand" in discarding "cumbersome, draped stage apparatus, and to don evening clothes." But Frikell, guarded and infirm, turns Houdini away that day. Houdini persists, "bombarding" Frikell with letters and clippings until the magician relents and agrees to meet him, yet as Houdini writes, "fate intervenes" when Houdini, finally returning to the house for his long-awaited interview, learns that Frikell had just died.





instructions for tricks (oftentimes with suggestions for credits, fixes, or Marlo's own handling), to advertisements for marketed magic tricks. Titles include Genii, Tops, New Tops, The Blue Print, Magigram, Legerdemain, M-U-M, Linking Ring, Tannen's Magic *Manuscript*, and others.

Marlo's comments - many, many thousands of them, spread over hundreds of pages -- are straightforward, and frequently can only be considered, through the lens of history, as both blunt and inconsiderate of any view other than his own. Yet, as private annotations, this should come as no surprise. In several cases, he goes so far as to annotate Dai Vernon's popular Genii column, "The Vernon Touch" ("Bull!" and "wrong" among other comments), just as he comments on a descriptions of tricks ("this is confusing - not at all a clear transposition"), takes shots at authors ("Typical [Paul] Harris reaching for effect," "Typical [Gerald] Kosky junk..." or about Busby and Pelky's "Succession Aces," "Bull! Its badly thought out."), or simply reviews the myriad magazines and their contents in a few forceful words: "Trite," "Not bad," "misses the point." Many annotations are self-referential, with Marlo always referring to himself in the third person, i.e. "Marlo's series came before Vernons [sic] books," and regularly points to "Marlo's" versions or methods for various tricks, ideas, and routines as counterpoints to what has been published in these magazines.





596. Marlo, Ed (Edward Malkowski). Ed Marlo Magic Trick Manuscript Archive. Thousands of pages of holographic and typewritten manuscripts of Marlo's magic effects, created over nearly a half-century, drawn from Marlo's own files. Most collated, primarily executed in Marlo's distinct yet readable hand, with many earlier manuscripts typewritten. A portion of the manuscripts are carbons kept by Marlo for his own files. Material dates from the 1950s to 1980s, the bulk later.

Among the sleights, routines, and tricks described are the Sleeper Shank Shuffle, Marlo Punch Deal, Marlo One Hand Crimp, Pressed Between (Marlo and Damico), Illogical Lie Detector, Double Eidetic Change, as well as ad copy for various Marlo publications including *Marlo's Magazine Vol.* 4 (and the foreword to this work, written in Marlo's own hand). Many of the manuscripts include corrections, annotations, illustrations, and comments from Marlo in the margins, as well as notes from notable members of the Marlo "table," Jon Racherbaumer and David Solomon among them. Hundreds (if not thousands) of original black-and-white photographs of Marlo's hands accompany the archive, each meant to flesh out and illustrate the routines and sleights. Most of these are identified on their own paper sleeves or the versos of the images themselves as to which effects they illustrate.

Associated ephemera frequently attached to the manuscripts or part of the archive, including correspondence from various editors and magicians, including publishers of periodicals to which Marlo was contributing. Many of the manuscripts bear Marlo's notations as to which publication he was submitting the material to (*New Tops, Hierophant, Apocalypse, The Linking Ring,* hardbound books by Kaufman, and many more).

Overall an irreplaceable and significant archive of the great "behind the scenes" card wizard of the twentieth century, one of the true titans of the genre whose output was virtually unmatched. This collection bears that statement out wholeheartedly.

A singular and significant accumulation of secrets from one of the magic world's most prolific technicians.

Widely regarded as one of the twentieth century's most prolific creators of card magic, few magicians realized how Marlo spent his working hours. For decades he worked in Chicago factories, performing the complicated task of a "set-up" man, the employee whose responsibility it was to set up industrial machinery so it could run for days, weeks, or months at a time. Marlo spent a large portion of his working years employed by the F.J. Littell Machine Company, whose name appears on these cards. As legend has it, Marlo was able to perform his set-up jobs in a fraction of the time others could; as a consequence, he used his extra hours at work to invent, refine, and record magic tricks and sleights of his own devising on the backs of the cards. He even, reportedly, wrote entire chapters of his books on the backs of some cards, many of which were passed off to typists or the editors of the dozens of periodicals to which he contributed. As one Marlo student remembered, Ed also used the cards as an ersatz pack of cards, with which he could work out various moves, stacks, and handlings while on the job; this way, if any superiors stumbled on Marlo taking liberties with company time, they would be none the wiser. After all, he was not toying with a pack of cards, but rather, a stack of IBM file cards that were part and parcel of his everyday tasks.


