



1. "Big 6" ("Wheel of Fortune") tabletop gaming wheel. [N.p., n.d.] Wooden gaming wheel with metal pins, on slanted metal stand (clapper is missing) decorated with dice. Approximately 20" in diameter. Some wear, a few scuffed areas on wheel with some loss to dice symbols. Wheel turns easily. Good. 400/600

2. Gaffed Roulette Wheel. Chicago: A. Ball & Bro. Makers, ca. 1930. A beautiful professional size roulette wheel with a builtin gaff. A hidden button under the outside rim pushes a piece of wood out from the ball track that will divert the ball into a certain section of pockets. Thus the dealer is able to keep the ball away from numbers (or a range of numbers) which carry the largest bets. 32" diameter. With later wooden display base, with green felt and on later legs.

3. Round Table Roulette. Approximately 14 1/4" diameter. Three-piece roulette wheel, including: a wooden, painted, circular base with central metal spike to insert in bottom hole of wooden wheel. Together with a wooden roulette wheel with numbers 1 through 36, 0 and 00; numbers painted in white on alternating grounds of black and red (0 and 00 painted on green background). Numbers form the outer band of the wheel; inside the number band are raised, separated compartments for catching the ball. Compartments are lined on the bottom with velvet of the corresponding color: the center of the wheel has a faux wood grained finish and is sloped to a peak in the center. The wheel is edged in 1 1/4" painted wood band, red with black edging. The bottom center of the wheel is fitted with a metal receptacle for the base spike - this is the spinning mechanism for the wheel. Together with the original metal lid: a small funnel-shaped top where the roulette ball is dropped into the lid; top of lid has seven black painted diamond-shapes radiating from the center; there is a green thick line painted above the rolled edge of the top where the rivets attach the inside frame of the lid; on the underside of the lid are 38 holes of 1/2" diameter around the circumference. Wheel could be gaffed by discreetly filling the holes with corks. See Time/Life book on Gambling, p. 175. (note: that book attributes wheel to Evans in 1909 catalog, but wheel does not match the catalog image).

4. Hidden Tabletop Roulette Wheel. [N.p., n.d., ca. 1900s-1920s]. Small roulette wheel is hidden inside the lid of a wooden candy dish, and can be easily turned over during a law enforcement raid. Approximately 8" in diameter, 6 1/2" high with lid on. Some scuffing, mild wear to roulette wheel, a few scuffs, small cracks to dish and lid. Overall, a very good example of this rare and unusual item.

5. [GAMBLING AND CHEATING]. A group of four assorted gambling or cheating items. Including: six mother of pearl chips, all decoratively engraved. All approximately 1" in diameter. In plastic (?) case, without lid. Some wear, cracking to case. Good. And: daub case. Metal daub case (no daub present). Approximately 1" in diameter. Light rubbing. Fine. And: cuff guard. Metal cuff guard, designed to keep a gambler's cuffs neat during play. Some tarnishing, wear. Good. And: wooden poker chip case with hinged lid. Lined in blue velvet, with a royal "Q" symbol on interior of lid. Chip lining worn, torn, some wear to box. Good.

6. Gaffed Dice Rake. [N.p., n.d.]. Craps dice rake with wooden shaft, leather cover on curved end. Approximately 33 1/2 "long. Handle has brass and silver-colored metal with hidden lockout (the area opens up where loaded dice can be stored and retrieved during play). Mild rubbing, small ink notations near curved end. Fine. Rare.

7. Cold Deck Holdout. American, maker unknown, ca. 1900. Unusual leather bag with zipper front. The zipper made it easier to access the interior for greasing and restringing. Very well made. Leather pouch torn upper left corner.

8. Will & Finck Bench Card Punch. San Francisco. ca. 1880s. Brass device used to make precise and subtle marks onto the surface of a playing card to later assist the crooked dealer in identifying them. Custom Lucite stand. Hallmarked. Scarce. 1,800/2,200

9. Brass Card Punch. American, ca. 1900. Finely made brass device that creates a bump on the back of a card that could then be felt by the dealer to determine the denomination. For instance a bump on the corner is an ace and in the middle a king, etc. 2" x 1 ¾" h.

10. Brass Card Punch. American, ca. 1900. Creates a bump on the back of a card that could then be felt by the dealer to determine its denomination or suit. 1". Excellent. 200/400

11. Lot of Two Brass Card Punches. American, ca. 1920s. Easily concealable devices which leave a tiny pinprick on the surface of a playing card, allowing the dealer to determine suit or value in dealing. Both lacking needle.







12. Lot of 67 H. C. Evans device instructions in the original envelopes. Chicago: H. C. Evans & Company, [ca. 1930s]. Typed, folded envelopes with names of the device instructions. Instructions are either mimeographed or printed; many envelopes have multiple copies of instructions. One diagram found (not all envelopes opened). Instructions include set-up and operation. In addition to the 67 envelopes with instructions, there are two empty envelopes. Some general wear due to age and use. Overall, fine. A rare and unusual group. Some instructions include: Instructions on No Miss for Playing Cards, Instruction on Pocket Roulette Wheel, Combination for Devils Bowling Alley Balls, Nautic Back, Instructions for Operation of the Skeleton Dealing Box, and many more.

13. Gaffed Chuck-A-Luck Cage. American, ca. 1950. German silver cage rotates on axis to roll the dice inside. With three large magnetic ("mag") dice inside that can be controlled by the operator. Cheating device. 10 3/4" high.

14. Lake Side Casino Glass Beer Stein. American, ca. 1890. Glass beer stein with pewter lid inset with porcelain disc reading "Lake Side Casino" in fancy script. Excellent. 7".

15. Will George Flamingo Hotel and Casino figurine. California: Will-George, ca. 1946. Painted ceramic figurine depicting a flamingo, stamped "Flamingo Hotel" to base. Height 9 1/2". Fine. These figurines have long believed to have been ordered by the Flamingo's owner, mobster "Bugsy" Siegel, and handed out as giveaways to select guests at the casino's grand opening over Dec. 26-28, 1946.

16. Lucky Sevens sign. [Tahoe City: IGT, n.d.]. Mirrored sign. 18. Collection of Gambler's Crooked Dice. Circa 1960. Suitcase Framed. Approximately 10 x 21 1/2". Mild rubbing. Fine. filled with three neatly-organized trays of approximately 250 100/200 loaded dice. Together with a table explaining the mathematical advantages possible for the use of various combinations. Most 17. Boston Whist Marker. "Paiemens Au Boston." French, pairs wrapped in foil; many loose pairs show wear or cracks. ca. 1790. Red leather case trimmed in black and gold with The "work" in each set varies and is indicated by handwritten set of rules and bone disc counter. Excellent. The "Règles labels on the wrappers.

Particulières Aux Paiemens" or rules sheet slips into a pocket 900/1.200 in the back.

19. Collection of Crooked Dice. Detroit: "Junior" Hinson. various dates. Including 24 "weights" (weighted dice), 183 "tops" (mis-spotted dice), 19 "flats" (misshapen dice), and 28 matching fairs (or "fronts"). Several marked Stardust Casino and Sands Casino, Las Vegas. Neatly organized in leather case with snap closures. Some wrapped in paper and identified on label. 254 total pieces. Sizes, shapes, and colors vary.











20. Poker Dice and Dice Cup in Custom Leather Box. [Circa 1880s]. Approximately 3 x 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Wooden box, covered with dark black leather; metal clasp; yellow satin lined interior. "Poker Dice" is stamped in gilt letters on top of box. Poker dice. two sets of celluloid dice. Five dice in each set for a total of ten dice. Dice Cup in off white/yellowish colored celluloid. Faintly stamped in purple ink on bottom of cup (exterior): "Patented / Oct. 21st / 1884". Brown felt lined interior of cup. Box is worn, dice and cup are mildly rubbed. An excellent set.

21. Magnetic Poker Dice Set. Set of five poker dice that are magnetic. Approximately 5/8". Mild wear.

22. Gaffed Red Magnetic Dice Pair. One is "D3", the other "D4"; to be used with chuck game; transparent red with white spots. Approximately 7/12".

23. Gaffed World's Fair High Striker. Chicago: H.C. Evans, ca. 1915. Attractive and small hardwood high striker used as a trade stimulator in saloons. Engraved brass number plates, wooden construction. Folds for storage. 22" high. Cleverly gaffed so the results can be controlled by the operator.

24. More than 60 Canisters of Card Marking Daub. Many different colors.

25. American Manufacture Marked Deck Playing Cards. New York: John J. Levy, 1868. 52 + 2EC. Even without the name Levy the courts and the ace of spades are plainly Levy's design. Levy did not want his name associated with a cheating deck thus "American Manufacture" was used. The two extra cards show how the suit and rank of each card can be determined by small variations in the snowflake design on the backs. Hochman16b. Excellent.

26. Marked Deck "Excelsior" Playing Cards. 52 with Instruction Card. Unmarked but almost definitely A. Dougherty, ca. 1864. Early marked decks are extremely rare. There is no manufacturer's name because a playing card maker would not want their name to be associated with anything crooked. Light browning around edges, otherwise very good. See Hochman AD4.

27. Three Daub Canisters with Safety Pins. The earliest circa 1900. All brass. A small screw on the back forces daub through a slit on the top, so that the sharper must simply rub his finger over the slit to apply it. With a pair of daub canisters, ca. 1930s, that pin on clothing.

28. Will & Finck Nickel Plated Gaffed Faro Dealing Box. San Francisco, ca. 1890. Marked "Will & Finck, S.F. CAL #562." Heavy nickel-plating on this mechanically precise gaffed dealing box. Sand-tell second card. Bottom button allows spring gravity to lock out slides. Right spring plate with gravity lockup. Housed in stitched leather box. Display cards included. 4 x 3 ¼". Excellent.

29. Will & Finck Crooked / Gaffed Faro Dealing Box. San Francisco, ca. 1880s. Gorgeous German silver "three-way" dealing box prepared in order to allow the user to maneuver seamlessly between fair dealing, second dealing, and, by means of an additional internal plate, "sand-tell" dealing. 4 x 3 ¹/₄ x 1 ³/₄". Lock mechanism functional. Hallmarked. Fine. 1,500/2,000











30. George Mason & Company Double Deck Dealing Box. Chicago, ca. 1910. Nickel plated box holds two decks for the game of "Red & Black," as well as Diana or faro. Display cards included. 4 x 3 ¹/₄". Excellent. Scarce.

31. Faro Dealing Box. Maker unknown, [n.d.]. This all-brass dealing box was made by hand by an excellent machinist. When the side button is depressed the front drops down to load the deck. Likely unique.

32. Will & Finck Faro Dealing Box. San Francisco, 19th/20th century. Heavy nickel-plated dealing box, gaffed. Marked by Will & Finck, additionally marked on underside "32-2420507/20th C. Fox." Obtained from Walter Moreau by Tom Blue. Collection of Tom Blue.

33. Will & Finck Faro Dealing Box. San Francisco, 20th century. Dealing box, gaffed with side squeeze, button on underside. Marked by Will & Finck. Collection of Tom Blue.

34. A. Ball & Bro Gaffed Faro Box. Chicago, ca. 1900s. German silver gaffed faro box with side-squeeze. Top plate held loosely, one pin detached but retained (may require repair). Collection of Tom Blue.

35. Gaffed Faro Box. 20th century. Stainless steel gaffed faro dealing box, marked CBS C2-141, and accompanied by a specially made Samuel Hart deck for the box. Collection of Tom Blue.

36. Geo Mason & Co. Faro Box. Denver, ca. 1900s. Manufacturer's mark on underside. Overall oxidation throughout.

37. [FARO]. Two decks of playing cards. Including: Russell & Morgan (Cincinnati, ca. 1900s), 52; and Samuel Hart (New York), 52. Both in Samuel Hart/NYCC Linen Eagle Pharo Cards printed boxes (worn). Square corners. One way courts.

38. [FARO]. Seven decks of playing cards. Group of seven square corner faro decks, including: (1) Samuel Hart & Co with Best Bower; (1) USPC Steamboat 999 (W1101); (1) Samuel Hart & Co (New York); and (4) American Manufacture in plain boxes (worn). Not individually checked, but all appear minimally handled/complete.

39. Four NYCC American Manufacture Faro Playing Card Decks. NYCC, ca. 1900s. Four decks, each complete (52). Hochman NY42B.

40. American Manufactory Faro Playing Cards. New York: Samuel Hart & Co., 1849. 52. Excellent. An unusual and very early Samuel Hart Faro deck with early AS and different one-way courts. Also note that the word "Manufactory" is a different spelling than the four decks below. Hochman NY30. All of the decks marked "American Manufactory" or "American Manufacture" were most likely seconds that Hart could sell at a discount. It is also possible they were marked and Hart did not want their name associated with a marked deck.

41. Four Packs American Manufacture Faro Playing Cards. New York: NYCC, ca. 1890. All decks complete with original white generic boxes. All have very light browning otherwise excellent. One has "second quality" stamped on the AC. Hochman NY42b.

42. Brick (12) of Jerry's Nugget Playing Cards. North Las Vegas, ca. 1980s. A dozen unopened packs of original Jerry's Nugget casino decks, six blue and six red backs. Cellophane lifting and torn on some packs, but generally fine.

45. Card Trimmer. George Graham, ca. 1940. Brass scissors card trimmer with nice refinements. Scissors with some light surface rust, otherwise excellent. A lovely example by this premier maker.


47. Card Trimmer. American. ca. 1890. Unmarked. Brass with bone handle. Minor crack where handle meets the blade, some very minor oxidation, otherwise excellent.

48. Card Trimmer. American, maker unknown, ca. 1890. Early 53. Will & Finck Brass & Steel Corner Rounder with Handle. brass blade trimmer with wood handle. Very good. San Francisco, ca. 1880. Brass and steel corner rounder with 600/800 handle on rosewood base. Marked "Will & Finck S.F.CAL." on both adjustment bars. $6 \frac{3}{4} \times 6^{\circ}$. Tarnishing on steel plate but 49. Card Trimmer. American, maker unknown, ca. 1880. Very overall, very good. A fine and scarce example of Will & Finck's early brass on wood card trimmer with blade trimmer and workmanship. nicely turned wood handle. Very good. 1,500/2,500 300/500 54. Will & Finck Nickel Plated Negative Card Trimmer. San 50. Card Trimmer. American, maker unknown, ca. 1900. Brass Francisco, ca. 1900. Allows the user to trim cards in a concave card trimmer with blade trimmer. Very good. shape. Marked on bottom "Will & Finck S.F. CAL." 5-3-1. Includes display cards. 5 1/4 x 1". Some tarnishing but overall, 400/600

51. Corner Rounder. American, ca. 1900. Brass and steel unmarked lever style corner rounder that can be mounted on table. Excellent. $4 \frac{3}{4} \times 4 \frac{1}{2}$ ".

52. Will & Finck Corner Rounder. San Francisco, ca. 1890. Brass and steel corner rounder with wooden handle, on wooden base. Marked "Will & Finck S.F. CAL" on both adjustment bars. 6 ¼ x 5". Excellent.

55. Will & Finck Twelve Deck Faro Card Press with Original Cards. San Francisco, ca. 1890. Includes six original Samuel Hart faro decks, four original American Manufacture faro decks and one partial faro deck. Marked on turnkey "Will & Finck S.F. CAL.". Lid and lock, no key. All decks excellent. 12 $^{1\!/_2}$ x 3 ¹/₂". Excellent.

56. Will & Finck Razor & Case and Large Will & Finck Shears. San Francisco, ca. 1890. Shears marked "Will & Finck S.F. CAL. 12¹/₂". Light pitting and rust. Straight razor in leather case. Case embossed "Will & Finck" and razor stamped "made for Will & Finck Co." on one side and "Finck's lightning made in Germany" on verso 6 ¹/₂". Case slightly worn, otherwise very good.









57. Will & Finck Folding Faro Layout. San Francisco, ca. 1890. Beautiful folding layout covered in green felt with hand-painted oilcloth cards in the suit of spades. Ace of Spades marked "Will & Finck 686 Market San Francisco, CAL." 20 x 17" (folded), 39 3/4 x 17" (open). Felt bears tiny moth holes, cards show minor wear, but overall excellent.

58. Will & Finck Faro Dealing Box. San Francisco, ca. 1880. Heavy nickel-plated dealing box with side rails and wheeled spring lifters. Well marked on underside of lift plate. Also comes with a rarely found original saddle stitched leather carrying case. Top slides very slightly front to back. Slight movement of rail indicates possibility of gaffing. Excellent.

59. Will & Finck Faro Dealing Box. San Francisco, ca. 1900. Nickel plated. Marked "Will & Finck Makers S.F. CAL'A." on underside of spring plate. 4 x 3". Excellent.

60. Will & Finck Roulette Ball Clamp. San Francisco, ca. 1880s. Gleaming metal clamp used to subtly manipulate the shape of roulette balls by adding sustained pressure to a specific area. 5 ¹/₂" long. Hallmarked. Fine.

61. Wood Faro Playing Card Press. American, maker unknown, ca. 1890. Nice dovetailed card press that will press twelve decks. One of the dividers broken, otherwise excellent. 100/200

62. Carved Wood Faro Case-keeper with Beads. Circa 1890. Includes a carved star surrounded by two leafy branches in the design. 13 x 12" open. Excellent. Will & Finck was the primary seller and manufacturer of top-of-the-line carved wood casekeepers. This unmarked beauty bears the three-screw hinges identified with case-keepers made by Will & Finck.

63. Jeu de Course Perfectionne Horse Race Game. French, ca. 1900. Mechanical game in paper-covered box. Four horses spin freely on course. Box well worn, good working condition. 300/500

64. Arm Holdout. Graham, ca. 1950. Also known as a sleeve holdout or third hand. Machine works smoothly and appears to be all original. Graham was a master machinist and made some of the finest cheating devices including card trimmers, dice shavers and corner rounders. Hallmarked with the Graham Triangle. Excellent.

65. Arm Holdout. American, ca. 1920. Also known as a sleeve holdout, third hand or Jacob's Ladder. Made of aluminum and brass with original canvas strap. Works smoothly.

66. Kepplinger/Martin-Style Holdout. [ca. 1940s]. Brass and steel knee-spread style device for stealing cards from and delivering cards to the operator's hand. With arm straps and leg strap. Scarce.

67. Arm Holdout. Maker unknown, American, ca. 1900. Holdout that could be adapted with a mirror to read the cards as they were dealt or a thief that could deliver a card into the hand. Straps and string renewed, but all other components are vintage. Working.

68. Three Antique Hold-Out Thief Attachments. For use with various Kepplinger-style holdout dice, including an extendable shiner and both a dice and card thief. Approx. 7" long each. Light or heavy oxidation and pitting. Also with three straps and an extra length of string.

69. Holdout Device. American, Jack Miller, ca. 1960. This device could be used to hold out various items.

70. Three Bean Shooter Holdouts. Circa 1990. Brass and Plexiglas devices that secretly steal cards from and deliver them to the hand of the magician or sharper. Very good. 200/300

71. Double Prong Bug Holdout. [Circa 1890]. One side is flat the other has a piece of metal attached to hold cards; each end has a point; Not Marked. "By bowing the device - the pointed ends could be stuck in the lining of the jacket - thus holding 2 playing cards for use as needed." Two prongs on each end sharp. Rare.

72. Double bug holdout. [Circa 1910]. Modified metal holdout which may be attached to the inside of an article of clothing via a soldered-on pin and secretly holds out two cards. Stamped "Made in England." Approximately 1 x 5/16". Rare.

73. Matching Pair of Keno Gooses, One Gaffed and One Straight. San Francisco: John Kewnig, ca. 1885. Excellent. The push slide is stamped "J. Kewnig Mkr. 10 Stevenson St. S.F." The gaffed goose operates by twisting the ring on top. This can expose a chamber in which the operator has placed the low numbers or one in which he has placed the high numbers. It has a partial set of wood keno balls. 21"h. See Levine, Bernard R; "Knife Makers of Old San Francisco" (pp. 126-128). Kewnig was one of San Francisco's premier knife makers who also sold "sporting goods." Before going off on his own he worked with John Meyer, a well-respected ivory turner. Kewnig probably continued to turn ivory for M. Price, San Francisco's premier knife maker after going off on his own. This is the only known set of keno gooses marked with his name.

74. A Keno Ball Board With 73 (of 75) Wood Keno Balls, an H.E. Mason Box of 25 Keno Balls, and 10 H.C. Evans Keno Cards. Included is an old cloth bag that housed the 73 keno balls. While these are not cheating items, this lot is included as a go-with to the keno gooses in the previous lot.

75. Gaffed Traveling Ball Drop Game. Circa 1940. Black hinged case houses a nail maze through which a dropped ball travels. Hand painted layout in bottom of case for the placement of bets. Includes two layouts, one marked "NY," the other "Engelbert Signs." Both hand painted. Gaff is controlled by mechanism on exterior of the case. 25 x 21".

















76. **Gaffed Silver Wheel Spindle Game.** American, ca. 1930. Wheel-shaped arrow/spindle game with nickel plated rim and twisted metal spokes. Includes two arrows and attractive leather case. Secretly gaffed for control by the operator in two manners, and can be locked by turning a screw head. Offered in the Mason and K.C. Card Co. Catalogs. 22" diameter. Felt toned, general wear evident, but good condition.

77. Shiner Ring and Instruction Sheet. Signet-style ring used to read cards as they are dealt off the top of the deck. Highly polished surface of the metal ring acts as a mirror. Ring a bit dingy, instruction sheet toned, with some tears, large chip to lower left corner (chip is still present). Rare with the sheet. **100/200**

78. Poker Chip / Check Shiner. Mid-twentieth century. Solid stack of six yellow poker chips inlaid with a fleur-de-lis design incorporates an angled mirror on one side. Hidden among a stack of regular chips, the device may be used to discreetly read cards. 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ diameter". Very good.

79. **Chip Cup Cheating Device.** Hollow stack of seven chips used to steal chips from the casino table or as a holdout for a pair of dice. With thirteen matching grey and black embossed \$1 chips from the Southern Club.

80. Brass and Mirror Ashtray. P.C.P. Booty, American, Oct. 19, 1926 (Patent No. 1604093). This could be placed on the table and as the cards were dealt the reflective surface would show the cards to the dealer. Brass and silver. Slightly tarnished, otherwise excellent.

81. F. E. Mason Brass & Steel Card Trimmer. American, ca. 1890. Mason was a fine engraver of firearms, and while it's not definitely known that this is the same F.E. Mason, it seems likely based on the quality of the engraving here. Highly unusual style. 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 4 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Some wear, one screw missing. Excellent.
