

BOB ROSSI

(1944 - 2020)

ob Rossi had a lifelong love for magic. Born in Brooklyn in 1944, in his early days, mixing with the likes of Milbourne Christopher (who he worked for as an onstage assistant), Al Flosso (from whom he developed an interest in the history of magic), and Joseph Dunninger (whom he idolized), nurtured a decades-spanning affection for all things mysterious, in virtually all of its forms. Professionally, Bob found great success in the toy industry, working in Asia for a variety of companies, among them Toys 'R Us, Tyco, and Tenyo. In later years, he developed an enviable collection of antiquarian magic books and ephemera, and a massive archive of memorabilia related to the "master mind of modern mystery," Joseph Dunninger. And in retirement, he pursued his passion even further, producing magic conventions, developing his own independent line of clever magic tricks, and further developing his collection. Using his voluminous files on Dunninger as source material, and coupled with his own expertise on the subject, Bob delved deeper into the life story of the magician he most admired, Joseph Dunninger, delivering talks on the subject, and hoping to some day write the definitive biography of Dunninger. The Bob Rossi Collection in the catalog that follows features antiquarian books, photographs, posters, ephemera, and rarities including The Houdini Bible, inscribed to Dunninger. Featuring a large portion of Dunninger's library and collection, the auction will offer an opportunity to obtain an array of scarce relics related to magicians, mind-reading, mentalism, and psychic investigation, prompting us to ask, as Dunninger did of his audiences, What's on your mind?

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THE AMAZING DUNNINGER MASTER MIND OF MODERN MYSTERY

Sold together with a tri-fold brochure for Dunninger reproducing the photograph on the front panel, the rear panel inscribed and signed, "My very first / With all the best / to Jay Marshall / from / Dunninger."





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



Tiny diamonds make up Dunninger's eyes on the face of each link.

Dunninger spent considerable time painting and drawing in his later years, but seldom showed his work; he did, on occasion, gift his work to close friends.







Bust portrait of Dunninger mounted to tag board, inscribed and signed in the margin, "To Chrystal / with my love / - Joe - ." Sold together with five holiday/birthday sentiments from Dunninger to Chrystal, inscribed "With love / Joe."

After an acrimonious divorce from Dunninger in the 1940s, Chrystal Spencer, a performer before she met the mind reader, went back to show business, taking lessons from Tony Slydini and performed occasionally as a professional magician.

IMPORTANT DUNNINGER SCRAPBOOK AND RESEARCH ARCHIVE

21. DUNNINGER, Joseph. Scrapbook of Dunninger's Newspaper Clippings, and Research Archive. Including a massive buckram scrapbook, the spine lettered in gilt with the text, "Newspaper clippings from the Dunninger Collection, Vol. 1" and being and approximately 400+ page oversized book filled with flyers, letters, advertisements, and hundreds if not thousands of newspaper clippings related to magic, the supernatural, ghosts, spiritualism, and related topics. Investigations into spiritualists and mediums are a frequent topic, and included are photostats of various letters related to Hereward Carrington and Arthur Conan Doyle and their belief (or lack thereof) in communicating with the dead. Included is a letter signed by Francis Martinka to Harry Houdini decrying any belief in spiritualism; a TLS from Nino Pecoraro stating that he used fraudulent means to apparently contact the spirit world (bearing the signatures of three witnesses, as well as Pecoraro); paperwork from the Conan Doyle Memorial Fund; stories regarding the Cottingley Fairies; an early Annemann advertising brochure; and memorabilia and clippings related to Kuda Bux, Herman Weber, Robert Ripley, Dante, Beatrice Houdini, Hardeen, Edward Saint, and various organizations focused on spiritualism and ghosts. A thick 4to book, disbound but with most contents clean and well-preserved and neatly mounted.

Sold together with: a large collection of approximately 500 newspaper clippings, advertisements, a small scrapbook of clippings from one of Dunninger's Popular Magic publications, and related notes regarding Dunninger's life and career, spanning his earliest days to his final moments both on stage and in his personal life. Organized in a series of albums, and well-kept for ease of study and handling.



Being an oversized album filled with programs, photographs, flyers, newspaper clippings (including full pages), and related memorabilia from the collection of or related to Joseph Dunninger. Included are a typed "Introduction for Dunninger's book on thought reading," presumably by Walter Gibson, along with several other manuscripts for magazine articles; press releases; small posters; blank Dunninger question slips; a portrait of Dunninger with Lucille Ball, dozens of handwritten pages of notes regarding Dunninger's stage routine and career; Small folio. Neatly organized, with the contents in good to very good condition.

23. [DUNNINGER - EPHEMERA] Gigantic Archive of Dunninger Correspondence, Manuscripts, and Ephemera. 1910s - 70s. A lifetime collection of brochures, advertising, newspaper and magazine clippings, programs, photographs, table tents, ALSs and TLSs, postcards, and handwritten manuscripts related to the personal life and professional career of the twentieth century's most successful mind reader, Joseph Dunninger. Among the highlights of the archive are early ALSs from Dunninger to fellow magicians on his pictorial letterhead, a penciled manuscript in Dunninger's hand describing his impressions of Al Flosso, several small advertising posters from the 1950s advertising Dunninger's live show, an early manuscript on theology from Dunninger's library and bearing his bookplate and signature, a Burling Hull manuscript inscribed to Dunninger, TLSs from Dunninger to Walter Gibson regarding the ghostwriting of a book and magazine articles, carbons of show scripts, letters to Dunninger from various correspondents, press releases, letters from Dunninger to various correspondents, pictorial handbills, brochures, early business cards, a letter of introduction to Walter Gibson by Dunninger for Bob Rossi (also signed by Gibson), tickets, and much more. With many dozens of items signed or inscribed by Dunninger, and most of the material housed in six display albums, and condition generally good to very good, though variable. An impressive archive of material that should be seen. 1,500/2,500



Over 100 programs for theatrical appearances made by Dunninger in vaudeville, and including many for his time on the Keith and Orpheum circuits, as well as private appearances. Including bound programs and singlesheet bills. Several signed or inscribed by Dunninger. 1918 -1959 (bulk 1920s). Sold together with over one dozen pictorial flyers, table tents, and related Dunninger advertisements. Neatly kept in five display albums. Nice lot.

Including images of a youthful Dunninger standing before stands of posters advertising his show, an image showing Dunninger at Martinka's before a group of large Kellar posters, another at Martinka's with Saram Ellison and Dr. Wilson, and over one dozen showing theater marquees advertising the show of Dunninger & Devlin, or Dunninger performing solo, and including images of the posters . 26. [DUNNINGER - PHOTOGRAPHS] Archive of Over 70 Vintage Photographs of Dunninger. 1930s - 60s. Large and impressive group of candid and studio photographs of the most successful mentalist of his era, posed in television and radio studios, with various celebrities (including Buster Keaton), on the lecture platform demonstrating the tricks of fraudulent mediums, captured in mid-performance in a series of unpublished photographs taken from the back of a large hall (including some images showing Dunninger walking among the audience), and a host of other images, including studio headshots from various times throughout his career. Four images inscribed and signed by Dunninger to Bob Rossi, including one with a nearly-illegible signature from near the end of his career. Bulk 8 x 10". Housed in two three-ring display binders. 27. [DUNNINGER'S GHOST WRITER] Lustig, David. Large Archive of David Lustig Scrapbooks, Scripts and Memorabilia. Including four scrapbooks kept by Lustig containing clippings, notes, typescripts, methods for various feats of mentalism, and ideas generated by Lustig for Dunninger and others. Among the memorabilia included are collections of Lustig's own columns for various publications, hundreds of pages describing his methods for a host of mentalism feats (slate writing, question and answer acts, Lulu Hearst-type routines, routines proposed for Maurice Fogel, a complete mental routine for night club settings (running to twenty pages or more), handbills for stage plays directed by Lustig, photographs, postcards, and more.

Sold together with two display albums containing over 100 pages of typescripts for Dunninger's Kem-Tone shows, gags for radio shows, as well as Brainbusters and Puzzlers devised by Lustig, both typewritten and handwritten. A fascinating and important archive related to the history of mentalism and one of its greatest practitioners, and the "idea man" who helped create much of the Dunninger legend and character.



Blaine and Dunninger had a long association, the latter illustrating several of Dunninger's books about magic tricks, and designing his bookplate. His illustrations appeared in The New Yorker and editions of works by Edgar Rice Burroughs, John Steinbeck, and other popular authors. Even so, the artist achieved only limited financial success during his lifetime, and Dunninger is credited with being his most reliable friend and patron.

A noted illustrator and painter, Maxwell's work appeared in many leading periodicals and publications, as well as in books by Pearl Buck, Aldous Huxley, Arthur Conan Doyle, and John Steinbeck.



With the original instructions and bag.

Harold Von Braunhut patented his version of the venerable X-Ray Specs (an improvement of an earlier design) in 1969. This set of "hypnotic" glasses with the Dunninger tie-in carries a copyright date of 1965. Von Braunhut and Dunninger (and Al

Much has been written of Houdini's special bond with his mother, Cecelia Weiss, and the profound effect her death had on him. Clement DeLion was a refined sleight-of-hand magician from Denmark who specialized in manipulative magic with billiard balls.

IMPORTANT MAGIC COLLECTING ARCHIVE

285. COLLINS, Stanley. Large Archive of Stanley Collins Letters to Jimmy Findlay. 1930s – 60s (bulk 1950s). An expansive and impressive gathering of correspondence from Collins to his fellow collector of magicana, regarding a wide variety of subjects related primarily to collecting. Written primarily through the 1950s, Collins discusses magic and collecting at length, filling most letters with his opinions on current events in the scene, as well as describing his recent acquisitions.

Collins was notoriously opinionated, and this archive reveals much of his personality. For example, "A pupil of mine has lent me the latest [Milbourne] Christopher crime entitled Varied Deceptions. I am not amused." "I have not seen the new magazine, but if it is worse than those already in circulation, then it must indeed be <u>bad</u>." About Geoffrey Buckingham he states, "...who in the world wants to waste time on such nonsense which is appreciated only by half-witted amateurs?" Nearly every letter from Collins contains similar content, and no magician, it seems, is spared commentary.

Sold together with an album of letters from Collins' widow, Margaret, to Findlay primarily regarding the dispersal of Collins collection after his death, as well as a group of partial letters and carbon replies from Findlay. Approximately 350 letters in all, both typed and handwritten, the whole neatly organized, and together a remarkable and personal record of two of the great British conjuring collectors of the twentieth century, including their interests, acquisitions, and sidelights on the passing scene. Also included are two books by Collins inscribed and signed to Findlay. Should be seen.

The collections of both Collins and Findlay are, to this day, spoken of in hallowed tones, as both men were pioneers in the field of magic collecting. Findlay's massive archive was dispersed in a series of auctions in the late 1970s after his passing, the breadth and depth of which has, arguably, never been seen again in the marketplace. Collins was a professional magician who invented a variety of tricks, wrote several books (of both his own inventions and on behalf of other magicians, using their names), and built up a remarkable collection of books, ephemera, and posters that was dispersed primarily after his death.



Hall repeatedly discusses a proposed bibliography of Henry Dean's Hocus Pocus, a project never completed; makes repeated attempts to purchase rare books from Findlay; discusses the origins of Sa Rid's famed book on conjuring tricks; and other related subjects, though rarely discussing personal matters or performing magicians at all. Hall's jealousy over Findlay's acquisitions is evident throughout. Typed and handwritten on a variety of letterheads and plain sheets of various sizes, and neatly organized in a single three-ring album. A fascinating archive.



Inscribed and signed on one front free endpaper by Houdini: "To / Dunninger / best wishes / Houdini / Nov. 30/1925." And then inscribed and signed again underneath by Dunninger in 1967 to noted Houdini collector Ray Ellenbogen.

Houdini's father was a Rabbi, and the family owned a bible printed in Hebrew which was bequeathed to the magician upon the death of his father in 1892. Years later, Houdini had a select few of these "forcing bibles" made to-order to present a clever feat of mind reading, as described above. Only four have survived, and this is the only example bearing his signature. The makeup of the bible was later copied by Al Mann who marketed an effect in the 1970s based on the original "Houdini Bible." (See next lot.)





Abbott, an ardent researcher into spiritualistic phenomena, wrote several books on the subject, exposing the tricks of fraudulent mediums. Arthur Conan Doyle, despite being a champion of logic and reason, as evidenced in his Sherlock Holmes stories, was also a fervent believer in spiritualism and communication with those in the "great beyond."







Powers' shop was a meeting place for many well-known magicians in the first quarter of the twentieth century. Dai Vernon recounted sessions with Dr. Elliott in the back room of Powers' shop, Fred Keating wrote about trying to fool Kellar on the sidewalk in front of the store (in a memorable story in the pages of The Sphinx). Many other "golden age" professionals frequented the emporium, including Guy Jarrett (who worked for Powers for a time). Powers, a theatrical manager who worked at New York's famed Hippodrome and one-time assistant to Roltare and Ching Ling Foo, became the New York representative for the Mysto Magic Company, but never issued his own catalog of tricks. He died in 1930.


