



Addams co-founded Chicago's Hull House, one of America's most famous settlement houses. In 1931 she became the first American woman to be awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, and is recognized as the founder of the social work profession in the U.S.

This is the rare first issue with the decorative F.A.I. bannered endpapers that was published by a Cleveland high school student named Jasper Wood, who was so moved on seeing the film that he convinced Hemingway to allow publication of the text. Approximately 50 to 100 copies of this first issue were ever produced; the second issue dropped the decorative endpapers and replaced it with plain tan endpapers with a statement printed on the rear pastedown. Hanneman A15.A.





I have been engaged for about the last two weeks in holding a meeting with our Bro. Myron J. Streator. We had a fine meeting and I think much good was done...This kept me out of college about three weeks and so a large amount of labor accumulated on my hands. I have been working incessantly since my return and have been nearly caught up. Our work for this term is Latin, Astronomy, Geology, and Evidence of Christianity. We are having good times except that both Charles and I are much haunted with bad colds... [reports on the weather]."

I am glad you are at Hiram, and I should very much like to be there a short time myself. You are doubtless having a good meeting & I think much good may be done.

I am exceedingly glad that you are willing to make some effort in reference to those books...I think that much good may be done by having those books here, for they will not only do good now, but for many years to come.

They will know as well as I, what books better be here—but I will mention a few and you can make what additions you may think proper... [lists titles requested]...I earnestly hope the weather will send them and Charles and I will try to keep them moving with much love I am as ever Your Brother/James".



Later entries would suggest Stewart was imprisoned, as on Dec. 29, 1864: "This day I received twenty six dollars...for the time I was prisoner in Richmond By Order of the secretary of war department." Several entries mention "cooking for" prisoners. Pages at the rear record money sent to his wife and relatives, addresses, and an account of letters received and sent. An interesting diary, well worthy of further research and study.

Harry Wickey was a noted illustrator, etcher and sculptor, born in Stryker, Ohio. Turning away from etching in the mid nineteen thirties due to eye damage from exposure to etching acids, he found his artistic expression in sculpture. The recipient of multiple honors and prizes for his work, his etchings found their place in the permanent collections of the Smithsonian Institution, The Whitney Museum of Modern Art, the National Academy of Design and many others. He devoted many years as a teacher at the Art Student League in New York. Many of his printed works depict Hudson River Valley Scenes.





Seth Arca Whipple, of Detroit, Michigan, was a noted marine painter of Great Lakes sailing ships and steamers in the era of transition from wind to steam power. His paintings have become iconic of that time and place, and as early as the 1880s The Calvert Lithographic Company of Detroit made large size lithographic copies of some of his paintings, many of which adorned steamship waiting rooms and offices. They are collectible in their own right. This original painting shows in remarkable detail a heavily loaded cargo vessel passing through the Detroit river, with Sandwich (now Windsor), Ontario on one side, and the city of Detroit on the other, with a steamer in the distance.





The purchaser agrees to pay Potter and Potter Auctions, Inc. a handling charge of \$50 for any check dishonored by the drawee. Shipping Terms - By Potter & Potter. Choice of packing and shipping method is strictly at the discretion of Potter and Potter Auctions. P&P generally provides in house shipping via FedEx or USPS to winning bidders.

Third-party shipping. Certain large, high-value, and fragile items will require the services of professional packing and transportation, or pick-up directly from our gallery. We suggest that you contact our Shipping Department before the sale for advice on the shipping and handling requirements that apply to the lots of interest to you.

If third-party shipping is chosen by the buyer or required by Potter & Potter, the buyer will arrange for removal of the merchandise from P&P within 15 days following the sale and must communicate and coordinate removal arrangements with P&P during regular business hours (Monday - Friday, 9am - 5pm).

Arrangements for third-party transportation are the responsibility of the buyer. We will not be responsible for the acts or omissions of carriers and packers whether recommended or not by us. Property will not be released to the shipper without the buyer's written consent and until payment has been made in full. Unless otherwise agreed, all purchases should be removed by the 15th day following the sale.

Risk of loss or damage in shipment. Any risk of loss or damage to the shipment through a third party carrier, once the item is removed from Potter and Potter, is at the risk of the buyer, and Potter & Potter is not liable for loss or damage of these items.

Ship to address. The winning bidder is responsible for providing Potter & Potter with an accurate address for the order destination as well as specific instructions for delivery.

Shipping costs. Shipping costs include charges for labor, materials, insurance, as well as actual shipper's fees. Buyer agrees to reimburse Potter & Potter the difference if actual shipper's fees exceed the invoice amount.

Storage fees. Potter & Potter will charge a storage fee of \$50 per week for any orders awaiting payment and/or removal for more than 15 days following the auction date. Non-Payment - If we do not receive payment in full, in good cleared funds, within seven (7) business days following the sale, we are entitled in our absolute discretion to exercise one or more of the following measures, in addition to any additional actions available to us by law: (1) to impose a late charge of one and a half percent (1.5%) per thirty (30) days of the total purchase price, prorated to commence on the date of the sale; (2) to hold the defaulting buyer liable for the total amount due and to begin legal proceedings for its recovery together with interest, legal fees and costs to the fullest extent permitted under applicable law; (3) to rescind the sale; (4) to resell the property publicly or privately with such terms as we find appropriate; (5) to resell the property at public auction without reserve, and with the purchaser liable for any deficiency, cost, including handling charges, the expenses of both sales, our commission on both sales at our regular rate, all other charges due hereunder and incidental damages. In addition, a defaulting purchaser will be deemed to have granted us a security interest in, and we may retain as collateral security for such purchaser's obligations to us, any property in our possession owned by such purchaser. At our option, payment will not be deemed to have been made in full until we have collected funds represented by checks, or in the case of bank or cashier's checks, we have confirmed their authenticity; (6) to offset against any amount owed; (7) to not allow any bids at any upcoming auction by or on behalf of the buyer; (8)to take other action as we find necessary or appropriate.

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Discretion - Any and all of the conditions may be waived or modified in the sole discretion of Potter and Potter Auctions, Inc.






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
