Roughly two copies of the first issue exist with an 1859 imprint. Folding diagram (few small separations at folds). Rebound in an early half olive green leather over marbled boards, raised bands with gilt tooling, compartments with double gilt filets, crimson morocco spine label lettered in gilt (boards rubbed, spine darkened with light wear at ends, label chipped, top edge dust soiled, marginal chipping to sig. This scarce second edition was considered by Darwin as "little more than a reprint of the first edition" and was the largest printing of any edition or issue in Darwin's lifetime.

"About half of the eight years that elapsed between its commencement and completion were spent on it. The book did not escape adverse criticism: it was said, for instance, that the public had been patiently waiting for Mr. Darwin's pièces justicatives, and that after eight years of expectation all they got was a mass of detail about pigeons, rabbits and silkworms. But the true critics welcomed it as an expansion with unrivalled wealth of illustration of a section of the Origin" (The Autobiography of Charles Darwin and Selected Letters, F. Darwin, editor, NY, 1958, p. 281).

Sears, former commander of the Kansas National Guard and a former Red Cross official, defends slanderous charges brought upon by Miss Mabel T., a boardman of the American Red Cross in Washington D.C., that prevented a bill from passing appropriating \$1,000 for a bronze tablet made in memory and in honor of Clara Barton, to be placed in the Memorial or Red Cross building being erected in Washington D.C. These charges were first issued in 1904, when Sears again defended the claims brought on by John. H. Morlan, alleging that Barton had diverted funds donated for relief victims of a Russian famine and the Johnstown flood to personal use which were abruptly dropped, and no report was issued. Barton later resigned from the "lifelong Presidency" of the American Red Cross amidst these allegations.



"Le Pegeonneau" or also referred to as "Squab", was Picasso's first execution of a linocut in 1939. In 1962, Heinz Berggruen, Paris's renowned dealer in Picasso prints and owner of one of the most important private collections of modern European art, had a visitation in 1962 by his "old friend", Pablo Picasso. "During their conversation, the dealer asked Picasso if he would like to see the linocut, 'Squab' ... in an artistic fury of spontaneity, Picasso picked up a red marking crayon and proceeded to attack the 'Squab'". 
Henry Woodhouse (Mario Terenzio Enrico Casalegno) (1881–1970), was the editor of *Flying, Aerial Age* and *Scientific Age* magazines, as well as author of a *Textbook of Military Aeronautics, Textbook of Naval Aeronautics*, and *Textbook of Aerial Laws*. Woodhouse was a colorful figure in the infancy of aeronautics, a member of many aviation consulting boards, and a respected authority in the field–being mentioned in the New York Times no less than eighty times.

Having become interested in aeronautics only a few years after the successful flight of the Wright Brothers, Woodhouse met, corresponded, and mingled with countless pioneers of aviation, such as Alberto Santos Dumont, the Wright Brothers, Glenn Curtiss, Richard Byrd, Robert Peary, Charles Lindbergh, Amelia Earhart, Augustus Post, and many political figures, government officials, and others.

He lobbied for the creation of the U.S. Airmail system, the building of fleets of thousands of warplanes to cross the Atlantic to help defeat the Germans in WWI, the adoption of the airplane as a commonplace means of passenger transportation, the training of Americans in the art of flying, the use of the airplane as a means of national coastal defense, and the expansion of its use in Central and South America.

Woodhouse, however, appears to have had a darker side, given his earlier manslaughter conviction and time spent in prison, all prior to 1910. Beginning shortly after, Woodhouse began a second career as a successful forger of historical documents. Much has been written about Woodhouse as one of America's best-known forgers, as he is known to have created a vast number of successful forgeries of George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and other historic figures' autographs and documents. Surprisingly, these included autographs of persons he knew well and could easily have asked to sign photos or other items.

All of the photographs and documents in this section of the auction are from the Henry Woodhouse collection. All are vintage originals, mostly unsigned, unless specifically indicated in the description of a lot. All are offered in "as is" condition, with no guarantee of authenticity as to any signature or inscription, although many certainly are authentic.
